
Chaplaincy Cross The Synod - Acts of Worship

The Synod and the discussion around the three questions began in earnest at All Saints in the last couple of weeks with every year group from Year 7 to Year 11 attending an Act of Worship, lead by Mr Sheehan and members of the Chaplaincy Team.

The Chaplaincy Team shared with their peers the enormity of the Synod and the wonderful opportunity it presents to young people to help shape the future of our Church. Jess and Rebecca in Year 12 explored the remit of the Synod and explained to the students that the documents of the Synod exist in languages that over 2.5 billion people can read, making their engagement with the questions a



truly universal activity. Alistair and Liam explored with the students the 'Road to Emmaus' and how the Disciples only just recognised Jesus in the final moments, before he disappeared from their eyes and encouraged the students to take the opportunity which the Synod offers and ensure they recognise Jesus in their own lives. All the students present were asked to respond to the questions of the Synod and the nearly 1000 responses have been collected and collated by Mr



Sheehan, ahead of a summary document being produced. These Acts of Worship were a wonderful opportunity for the students to see and partake in the Global Church of which they are all members.



Food donation for local foodbank

Students and staff have started the Advent season by reflecting on the need of those within our own local community as we fast approach Christmas. The decision was made that our first fundraising action of Advent would be to collect food and other items for our local foodbank – The Sherwood Forest foodbank situated in Mansfield Woodhouse. Throughout the first week of Advent staff and students brought in their donations which we then all gathered together ahead of the foodbank coming in on Friday 3rd December to collect the donations. With almost 50 boxes of food donated the collection

team from the foodbank were blown away by the generous giving of the staff and students at All Saints' and wanted to make sure every member of our school community knew what a difference our donations would have on the those in need within Mansfield this Christmas. We had so many boxes that the site team, together with Mr Sheehan and the willing support of the Director of NDCYS Tom Baptist certainly got their daily cardio in moving the boxes from the chapel to the front of school! Thank you again to all the staff, students and parents who supported this wonderful act of Christian charity and giving.

Year 7 Retreat Day

On Wednesday 8th December, the whole of Year 7 experienced their first Retreat Day at All Saints'. The day started with an introduction to the day by Head of RE and Chaplain Mr Sheehan. He discussed with the students how we can encounter Christ in our lives, with students sharing their own experiences of encountering Christ, through acts of kindness and service. The students then explored the Feast Day of the Immaculate Conception and how Mary can be a great role model for how to say yes to God and allow for a meaningful encounter with Christ.

During Period 2, the students were guided through a meditation by their teachers, to give them the time to reflect on the messages and ideas from Period 1. Feeling refreshed the students then engaged in group work discussing and then answering the three questions of the Synod.

In Period 3, the students explored the global nature of the Church and reflected on some of the issues facing people throughout the world through the work of CAFOD. The students then got creative and set about building their own global community through the decorating of their own paper chain people, which will later feature as a display in the chapel.



In Period 4, the school welcomed back former teacher Ann Neale who delivered an outstanding CAFOD workshop to the students – where they played the game 'life without taps'. Through engaging with this game the students were able to gain first-hand experience of how difficult life is for some people around the world.

To close the Retreat Day, the students celebrated Mass and the Feast of the Immaculate Conception with Fr Marc. It was a wonderful celebration of Mass with the students having prepared each part of the Mass.

The Positives

Social media enables families to celebrate Christmas with longdistance relatives by sharing photos and sending messages.

It enables single parents and only children to access social support in tough times.

Social media helps introverted or socially reserved young people connect and celebrate with friends in a safer and less overwhelming environment.

Key Quote

"As far as self-confidence goes, so much of social media is about approval, getting likes, comparing our lives to others' - meanwhile, confidence is an inside job: it's about how you feel about yourself regardless of what anyone else does or thinks. It's knowing that you're human, you're flawed, and you're awesome in your own way."



The Negatives

A newsfeed filled with photos of parties and expensive presents is likely to affect even the most resilient of young people. It can make us feel lonely, worthless, and frustrated. It's difficult not to compare what we have or don't have with our peers.

Christmas time gives bullies the opportunity to tease their less fortunate peers by showing off new gadgets or mocking the gifts that other people have received.

It is possible that social media at Christmas time could give young people FOMO (Fear of Missing Out). FOMO can cause individuals to accept invites to parties or seek invitation to events to avoid feeling like they've missed out on the fun. This phenomenon highlights the need for young people to always feel connected and valued socially.

We live in a culture where everyone's opinion, view, and assessment of situations and people spill across social media, a lot of it anonymously, much of it shaped by mindless meanness and ignorance. It's important that we don't let other people's negativity ruin the festivities.

It seems that people are more into other people's lives than their own. We see everyone else's success online, and we allow it to magnify our own failures.

Tips to help reduce Social Media usage

Turn Off All app-based Notifications

Notifications from apps are often the single biggest source of distraction, so, help your child manage their Fear of Missing Out (FOMO) and encourage them to turn off all app-based notifications this Christmas.

Delete Apps Your Child Doesn't Use

It might be a good idea to use the Christmas period to have an App clear-out. There may be Apps on your child's phone that they don't use but are still getting notifications for.

Limit Your Child's Usage

Rationing time for social media use can go a long way in cutting down our levels of screen-time.

Find A New Hobby

The Christmas period may be a good time to encourage your child to swap social media for a new hobby. Focusing on a fulfilling hobby may help your child manage their social media usage better. This could be a new skill or something your child has wanted to do but hasn't had chance. i.e. learning a new musical instrument or learning how to bake.

'Stand up' project

A group of students, who are 'no to hate' ambassadors received some training from Kelly Scott, who works at the National Holocaust Centre and Museum.

The training started with a fantastic video where footballers urge fans to 'stand together' against racism in a Holocaust Memorial Day video. This was a great way to start the students thinking about what it means to be an upstander and not be a bystander when you see hate crime. Kelly



took the students through case studies of people in history that have been subject to hate crime, leading to great discussion about why this is not acceptable.

The Forever Project is an extension of the highly successful concept first developed by the Museum for Holocaust survivors.

As with these remarkable men and women, we wish to make inspiring role models – from the arts, sciences and beyond – accessible to the public any time, any where.

Students had the chance for a Q&A session with a holocaust survivor.

Finally, students ended the day writing a pledge to show how we can be upstanders at All Saints'.

The training will now be used to prepare resources and an Act of Worship to educate all other students.

Peer Mentoring

As part of our newly established Peer Mentor programme, two of the mentors have planned and delivered a safeguarding assembly to years 7 to 11. Scarlett and Molly in Year 11 took the lead on the assembly informing students about how to keep themselves safe, how to support others, signs to look out for and who to speak to if students have concerns.
