

What is it like to attend this school?

Leaders have high expectations of all. Pupils, including sixth-form students, respond well to this challenge. They are determined to succeed. Pupils often work with great concentration in lessons. They achieve well. Staff model the considerate behaviour they want pupils to have. Pupils have excellent manners. They will, for example, readily hold open doors for visitors. Pupils are happy at school. They feel safe. Pupils say they always have someone to turn to if they have a problem. They behave well in classes and at breaktimes. Pupils follow the 'All Saints Way', the school's approach to good, caring behaviour. They show respect to everyone in the school community. Most pupils agree that bullying is rare. They say that if bullying does take place leaders deal with it well. This is a highly inclusive school. Pupils of all faiths or no faith feel included in school life. One pupil reflected others' views by saying, 'This is a school where people get on.' Pupils benefit from the values the school promotes, such as kindness and compassion. They raise funds for many charities, including the British Heart Foundation and CAFOD (Catholic Agency for Overseas Development).

Pupils have excellent manners.

Leaders offer a wide range of opportunities for pupils to develop their interests.

Staff work together as a team to ensure pupils are safe. Pupils say they always have someone to turn to if they have a problem.

Pupils have many opportunities to think about social, moral, spiritual, and cultural issues as they learn.

Pupils are happy at school. They feel safe.





Transition Support

Between the October half term holiday and Christmas holiday and then later in the year, between the February half term and Easter holiday I make myself available to all Catholic partner schools and some of the larger local primary schools. This means that, at the request of the school, I am able to drop in to meet and support youngsters in a range of different ways. This often means making a presentation in an assembly, but could also include working in the classroom with different groups of children in any year group, supporting them to be secondary- ready when the time arises.

During Year 6

Mrs Harris visits all partner schools and some of the larger local schools (virtual or physical) to talk to students about life in secondary school. Students are encouraged to make use of activities on the All Saints' Transition section of the website as well as to begin their folder of secondary-ready evidence. Mrs Harris works closely with all primary schools who have children securing a year 7 place. Information is shared regarding every single child joining us to ensure all needs are met and a smooth transition is facilitated.

Students joining us from non-Catholic primary schools are invited for a Catholicity session to help them to understand what it means to be joining a Catholic school and community.

This is lead by our school Assistant Chaplain and Father John.

Students on the SEN register are invited for additional visits when it is deemed appropriate.





Transition Support

During Year 5

We have a growing range of activities focused around Curriculum subjects. Children in Partner primary schools have access to taster sessions in a range of subjects, by visiting All Saints' or by All Saints' teachers leading workshops in the primary schools.

Sports Festivals take place at All Saints' for younger children at partner primary schools, in different year groups throughout the year.

Guided tours of the school take place.

Partner primary school children are invited to a taster day combined with watching a school production.

Prior to Year 5

There are a growing range of connections between different curriculum subjects at AS and partner primary schools, giving youngsters access to school site visits and subjects being delivered by specialist teachers using specialist equipment.





Pastoral Structure

- Tutor groups less than 30 children in each group, 7 groups, all a mix of ability, primary schools.
- Tutor time 30 mins every day in morning build excellent relationship with your tutor. Your first point of contact. Collective worship, learning activities, well-being support, team building, admin.
- YPL and AYPL Year Progress Leader is Mrs Harris and you will have an Assistant Year Progress leader, who is generally in charge of rewards and enrichment opportunities.
- Contacting school Organiser, telephone, e-mail. Form tutor is first point of contact for general enquiries, curriculum teachers for academic queries.
- Progress reports 2 full reports per year and an on-line parents' evening with access to all curriculum teachers.
- Support JPC / mentoring Support is available at a range of different levels when your child is struggling academic support, pastoral / well-being from peer mentor, form tutor, well-being officers to external agencies. Short term and longer term support packages and bespoke work available.
- SEN If you are on the SEN register in primary school you will be contacted by Mrs Bamford who will discuss support available for you.

Non-negotiable expectations


- Students must arrive punctually to school.

UNIFORM LIST

Black Blazer with the All Saints' school badge, which must be worn at all times. (Permission may be given to remove the blazer in hot weather)

Plain white shirt, all buttons to be fastened- short sleeved or long sleeved. No polo shirts. Shirts must be tucked in.

School tie, which must be clip on.

Plain <u>black</u> formal school trousers (no leggings, denim, canvas or lycra). Trousers must be tailored and not skin tight, tapered or tight around the ankle.

Plain black or dark socks (ankle length only)

Plain black formal low-heeled shoes (no trainers/sports brands, canvas, high heels, boots of any type or sling backs)

Outer wear: Students must wear a dark coloured practical coat (leather and denim coats, sweatshirts, hooded tops and sports branded jackets are not permitted). These are not to be worn in classrooms.

Baseball caps are not permitted to be worn in school.

Students must have a practical school bag, which must be big enough to carry a number of A4 size books

Optional items: Grey plain knitted v-neck jumper. Sweatshirts / cardigans are not allowed.
